

Monika, single, English as another language, had worked professionally for many years before doing her PhD in North America. She lived a two-hour commute from the university and continued to work part-time during the degree for financial reasons. She joined the Canadian study in 2006 in her third year of her PhD. She imagined a local research-teaching position given she was caring for her elderly parents, and completed the degree when she was 49. What struck us about Monika's story was:

Ongoing stress and parental care (personal)

Issues with supervision feedback and working to deal with financial issues during the degree (work experience)

Not having publications so not competitive and teaching part-time the only academic work she could get (career thinking)

PhD Year 6 Post-PhD Year 1	Caring for parent, so experiencing considerable stress. Diagnosed with illness.	No time to try and publish from PhD. Completed thesis though 'could not do the thesis as I wanted'. Continued working part-time. Stopped part-time work.	No time to apply for jobs. Offered courses to teach.
Post-PhD Year 2	Caring for parent, but some time for social activities.	Taught a graduate course and had PhD paper published; started writing a book.	Applied for academic positions locally, invited for(1) interview, but not offered position; realized lacked publications.
Post-PhD Year 3	Not able to look farther afield for positions due to parental care.	Taught 3 courses in different universities with good student evaluations. New publication.	Applied for 2 academic positions locally; not called for interview; job market uncertain; lot of competition.
struck us	Stress. Parental care.	Issues with supervision feedback. Working to deal with financial issues.	Teaching part-time the only academic work she could get Not having publications so not competitive.

(1) Comprehensive exams (demonstrating depth and breadth of knowledge) are a required element of most North American PhDs. They must be completed successfully before doing a thesis proposal defence (which is similar to a transfer of status).
